
Sierra Nevada snowpack disappearing after driest January-February in recorded history, third year of California drought all but inevitable

Snowpack down to 64% with no major storms on horizon as winter rainy season has only 1 month left

- Snowpack is decreasing and temperatures are warm throughout the Sierras.
- Drought conditions are appearing worse throughout many areas of the state, as compared with 2021.
- Folsom Reservoir is at roughly historical average storage, other reservoirs are not faring as well.
- RWA called on its members for 15% conservation last year, as well as shifting away from using surface supplies.
- Worsening drought conditions this year may warrant continued action by RWA members.
